IKE Kiosks

Charm City Circulator

Water Taxi










INNER HARBOR

All roads lead to Pratt Street and the Inner Harbor. This is often where visitors head first to take in the waterfront views and check



out the National Aquarium, Maryland Science Center, or City Cruises. On the North side of Pratt Street you'll find swanky dinner options at Blackwall Hitch, Fogo de Chão, and The Capital Grille. And, right along Market Place you'll see Power Plant Live!, with a mix of restaurants, bars, and live entertainment venues.

- Port Discovery Children's Museum: The best on the East Coast for kiddos and parents
- Miss Shirley's Cafe has a breakfast/brunch/lunch menu that is oh so Baltimore
- Historic Ships: Five ships tell the incredibly rich history of Baltimore's waterways
- Baltimore Visitor's
 Center is located at
 401 Light Street, where
 you can stop in and learn
 more or pick up a souvenir



CHARLES CENTER

This traditional office district has turned into a residential hub with diverse dining options and local bars. Dine in style at Zanders under Tiffany-stained glass and marble ceilings. You'll find international cuisine on



display at Puerto 511, Lumbini, and R&R Taqueria. If the weather is nice, head to the LB Skybar located on the rooftop of the Lord Baltimore Hotel—the views are spectacular.

- Public spaces:
 Center Plaza provides year-round programming;
 Preston Gardens is a lush green space with tons of history; and the Liberty
 Park Dog Run welcomes four-legged friends
- The B&O Brasserie cocktail list is as thoughtful as it is inventive
- The Chesapeake Shakespeare Theatre, tucked along Calvert Street, is a class act
- The JFX Farmers Market, on the outskirts of the neighborhood under I-83, is arguably the largest and most amazing farmers market you will ever visit



MOUNT VERNON

Going North on Charles Street is Mount Vernon, a National Historic Landmark District of Beaux-Arts architecture and stately park spaces with the nation's first Washington Monument at the center. Nearby is the Peabody Conservatory and the alwaysfree Walters Art Museum. Just south is the Basilica of the Assumption, the first Catholic



Cathedral in the United States. The area is as rich in cuisine options as it is history, including Thai, Afghani, Korean fusion, Indian, Spanish, and Nepali options within walking distance.

- Visit the boutique Hotel Revival to take in the incredible artwork throughout and enjoy the rooftop restaurant, Topside, or rent a karaoke room at B-Side
- After hours, act like a local at Sugarvale (or grab food all day from their sisterrestaurant Dooby's)
- Stop into the historic and beautifully restored Enoch Pratt Library
- Catch a show at the acclaimed theatre,
 Center Stage
- Grab drinks at Ash—Bar, you'll thank us later




This Arts & Entertainment District is named after the 1911 Bromo Seltzer Tower—modeled after the Palazzo Vecchio in Italy—that houses art spaces at the gateway of the neighborhood. The District has more than 30 art galleries, music venues, and theaters, including Everyman Theatre and Baltimore's home for Broadway, the Hippodrome. The district is



undergoing a transformation, including the completed restoration of the world-famous Lexington Market.

- Current Space and Le Mondo, two art spaces across the street from each other, offer contemporary exhibits and programming
- Faidley's Seafood has the world's best crabcakes they have single-handedly made us famous
- Since it's reopening in 2004, the historic Hippodrome theatre is the city's premier venue for touring Broadway productions and other high quality performances
- The Eubie Blake Cultural Center has diverse and interesting live performances and exhibits



A historic Baltimore neighborhood between Camden Yards and University of Maryland, Baltimore, this small area is mostly residential, with a few Airbnb's tucked in. It's just across the street from entrances to Oriole Park and Ravens Stadium, and a




short walk to the B&O Railroad Museum or Babe Ruth Birthplace Museum. If you're looking for picturesque row homes and classic Baltimore architecture, this walkable neighborhood is worth some exploration.

- Check out Game Baltimore for ping pong, video games, and plenty of screens to watch a game
- Rachael's Dowry Bed and Breakfast is a charming B&B, located in a restored 18th century home, offers a charming and intimate alternative to local hotels
- Rub elbows with the locals at Corner Bistro
 Wine Bar. This cozy neighborhood bistro and wine bar located just blocks from Camden Yards
- The Horseshoe Casino offers entertainment alongside Gordon Ramsay Steak restaurant



PIGTOWN

Steps from the stadiums and a quick walk to the B&O Railroad Museum is Pigtown, a historic neighborhood in Downtown that is quietly thriving. The Pigtown Main Street program supports local retailers and



has year-round programming, including their marquee Pigtown Festival each September where you can literally watch pigs run through the streets.

- Suspended Brewing Company, open on the weekends, is a new local brewery that is more than just beer. With art openings and a social mission, it's charming and sustainable
- Swing into Mobtown Ballroom for their Friday night dance party
- Learn more about Pigtown at pigtownmainstreet.org



FEUENAL III / South Baltimore

Federal Hill is on the south side of the Inner Harbor. Along Key Highway, you'll find the American Visionary Art Museum and, just past that, the Baltimore Museum of Industry. The Federal Hill neighborhood is densely



packed with unique shops, bars, and restaurants. The main intersection is Charles Street and Cross Street, where you'll find the newly renovated Cross Street Market.

- Originally opened in 1846, Cross Street Market has dozens of stalls from local restauranteurs—come hungry
- Federal Hill Main Street hosts year-round events. Visit FedHill.org to plan your visit
- AVAM has been named one of the best contemporary art museums in the world
- Nightlife here is solid, including Crossbar,
 Magerk's, No Way Rose, and live music at The 8x10



HARBOR EAST

A newer neighborhood with white-tablecloth restaurants and designer boutiques, Harbor East is located just east of the Inner Harbor. You'll find a Whole Foods and some of the best restaurants in the city, including Cinghiale and Charleston, owned by



the James Beard-nominated team of Foreman Wolf. Don't miss the seafood at Loch Bar or the amazing view from Bygone, both of which are located in the Four Seasons Hotel.

- Treat yourself to a spa day at the Four Seasons, and in the winter, visit their rooftop ice skating rink
- Grab a bite at over 15+ restaurants and eateries including Bar One and The Oceanaire Seafood Room
- Enjoy a scenic outdoor shopping experience that includes big box favorites like Lululemon and Madewell as well as local small businesses



LITTLE ITALY HISTORIC JONESTOWN

Nestled between the Inner Harbor and historic Fells Point, visitors go to Little Italy to dine at its restaurants, watch outdoor movies, play bocce, attend Italian festivals, worship at Saint Leo the Great Italian parish, visit the Sons of Italy/Little Italy Lodge, and



stroll through the narrow streets to experience a bit of the amore and ambience of the old country.

Historic Jonestown is home to the Jewish Museum of Maryland, the Phoenix Shot Tower, and the renowned Reginald F. Lewis Museum.

- Many restaurants valet but there is a Little Italy Garage tucked on Exeter and Bank Streets
- Chiappareli's is the oldest restaurant in the neighborhood (opened 1940)
- The 1840's Carrollton Inn is truly a one-of-a-kind boutique hotel comprised of 19th-century row homes
- The Reginald F. Lewis Museum and the Star Spangled Banner Flag House Museum are right next to each other—it's easy to see both in one visit



This is where Baltimore
Towne was first chartered,
and it still has the historic/
nautical feel. It also has
the highest ratio of bars

per capita in the city. The main strip is on Broadway, where you can explore the newly renovated Broadway

Market, grab a beer at

Max's Taphouse, and eat at Twist Fells Point. The Water Taxi has multiple stops in the neighborhood, one of which is right outside of the Pendry Hotel along the waterfront.

- Fells Point Mainstreet, fellspointmainstreet.org, hosts festivals and has the best directory for the neighborhood
- Make sure you check out Ekiben, an incredibly unique Asian Fusion bowls and bites made with the freshest
- The Frederick Douglass-Isaac Myers Maritime Museum has robust info on Baltimore's maritime past and African-American history
- Retro record store
 The Sound Garden has
 tons of vinyl and is known
 for famous recording
 artists pop-up events



University of Maryland, Baltimore is so big that is has a neighborhood named after it. The campus, bio park, and medical center make up most of this rapidly developing area, but it's also home to the gravesite of Edgar Allen Poe at Westminster Hall. Just



north of UMB is Seton Hill, a primarily residential neighborhood that is best known to visitors for St. Mary's Park, home to the monthly Baltimore Bike Party held the last Friday of every month.

- Rent a bike and join thousands of bikers who meet at the park at 6:30 pm for a themed ride around Baltimore on the last Friday of the month. Learn more at baltimorebrewclub.com/ baltimorebikeparty
- While Lexington Market is technically in the Bromo Arts District, the Paca side of the Market opens to the UMB neighborhood, offering tons of food options within walking distance
