

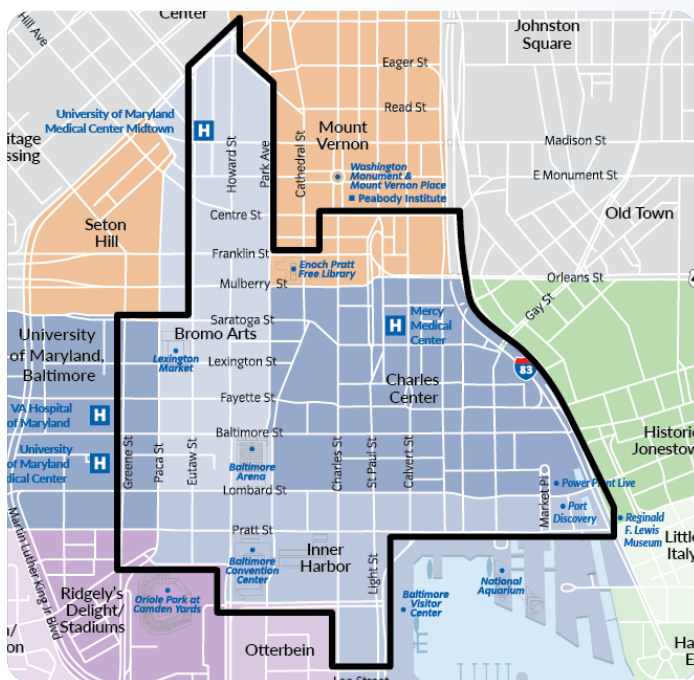

Operations & Safety Update

This quarterly report is intended to keep Downtown Baltimore stakeholders, businesses, property owners, and residents updated on the latest safety data available for our neighborhoods. June's newsletter provides insights on safety data from **January-March of 2022 (Q1)**.

Safety Deployments

Downtown Partnership runs steady deployments, listed below, but also join forces with our City Partners to adjust where needed.

Downtown Baltimore Guides (DBGs)

16 uniformed ambassadors performing business checks, assisting visitors, and providing eyes on the ground for DPOB.

Monday - Sunday, 7am - 5:30pm

Private Security

8 unarmed security officers, available to assist with safety escorts.

Monday - Friday, 12 - 8pm

Maryland State Police

2-4 marked Maryland State Police Officers per shift.

Sunday - Thursday, 4 - 10pm

Friday - Saturday, 4pm - 12am

FOCUS AREAS

Deployment of private security assets are currently focused in the following corridors:

- 100-500 block of N. Charles Street
- Light & Conway Streets
- President & Lombard Streets
- Light Street, Baltimore - Lombard Street
- 300-600 blocks of E. Pratt Street
- As needed for special events coverage

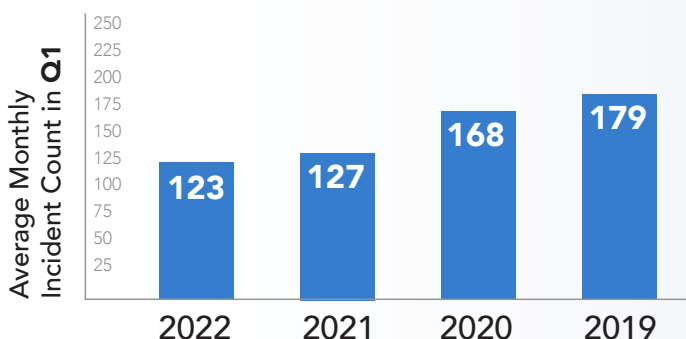

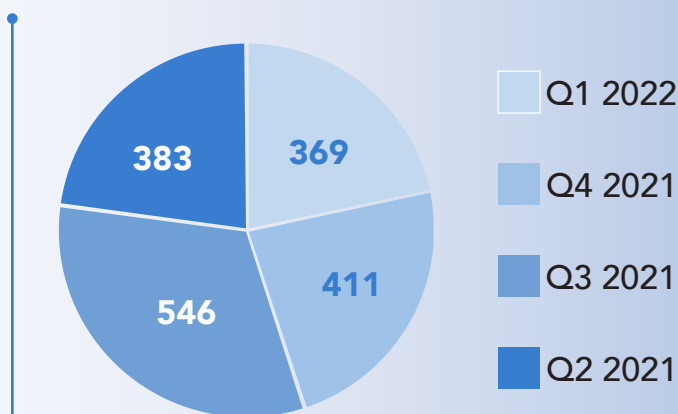
Q1 Safety Data

Overall, crime has remained below historical highs. When looking at data from Q1, crime in 2022 was down 3% compared to 2021, down 27% compared to 2020, and down 31% compared to 2019.

INCIDENT OCCURRENCE SAW A 10% REDUCTION OVERALL FROM Q4 2021 TO Q1 2022.

Comparing Occurrences of Common Incident Types

Incident Type	Occurrences in Q1 2022	vs 2021	vs 2020	vs 2019
Common Assault	87	107 (-19%)	107 (-19%)	118 (-26%)
Larceny	96	91 (+5%)	151 (-36%)	172 (-44%)
Agg. Assault	48	48 (+/-0%)	43 (+12%)	38 (+26%)
Burglary	35	21 (+67%)	37 (-5%)	35 (+/-0%)
Larceny (Auto)	29	78 (-63%)	84 (-65%)	67 (-57%)



SAFETY TIPS Overnights continue to be a period of higher activity. Businesses and citizens should remain aware of their environments after dark. Locked doors and out-of-sight valuables continue to be effective deterrents for acts of theft. Theft of bicycles has increased in recent months, citizens are encouraged to lock them up in safe locations.
